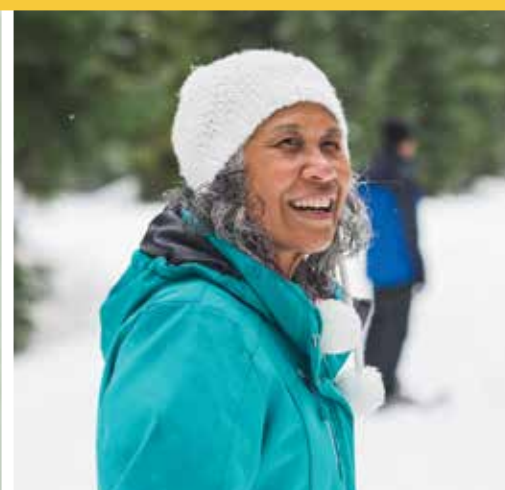

ONLINE

If you are interested in personal assistance, stop by the Parks Administrative Building located at 1301 Mitchell Boulevard in Springfield during our business hours, Monday through Friday, 8a.m. - 5p.m. to register in person.

HOW

Registration is first come, first served until spots are full. Late sign-ups and transfers are allowed only if there's space. A \$5 late fee applies after the deadline. You can register online, by mail, in person, or by phone. Sign up early- programs fill fast! If a program has a deadline, you must register before it. If it's full, you can join the waitlist and will be contacted if a spot opens.

PAYMENT

Payment of fees are due when you register. Phone registrations must be paid by credit card. Please make checks payable to: CCPD (Clark County Park District). Note: \$25 service fee on all returned checks.

CONFIRMATION

Once you send the registration form and fee, you are signed up if there is space. You will get an email with program details. Come to the first class at the scheduled time and place unless told otherwise. Athletic League players will hear from a coach about practice and games after the first meeting.

REFUNDS

All customer-initiated program or activity withdrawals are entitled to receive a household credit for the program fee minus a 15% refund processing fee if requested in the allotted time:
Camps • Two days following the original registration deadline.
Athletics • One month following the original registration deadline.
Special Events - Single Day Events or Instructor-Provided Classes • Prior to original registration deadline.

nature FOCUS

HOW OUR FEATHERED FRIENDS SURVIVE THE WINTER

Winter in Ohio can be snowy, icy, and chilly, but many of our local birds stay right here in Clark County instead of flying south. These year-round neighbors, like the Tufted Titmouse, Northern Cardinal, Black-capped Chickadee, Blue Jay, Downy and Red-bellied Woodpeckers, and Screech Owl, rely on a whole set of survival strategies, and they depend heavily on the natural spaces in our parks to pull it off.

One of the biggest challenges for birds in winter is staying warm. To prepare, they grow extra feathers in the fall, giving them a thick, insulating coat long before the first real cold snap hits. When they fluff their feathers, they trap warm air close to their bodies, turning themselves into walking, flying winter jackets. Many species use tree cavities, old woodpecker holes, and even nest boxes to shelter from wind and sleet. In our parks, the mature woodlands at places like Snyder Park, George Rogers Clark Park, and Rebert Pike Nature Park provide exactly the kind of deep cover birds need. Chickadees, tiny but tough, take survival up a notch by entering torpor, a brief “mini-hibernation” that conserves energy when the temperature plunges.

Food is the second big hurdle. Once snow covers the ground, finding calories becomes an all-day effort. Woodpeckers stash seeds in tree crevices during the fall, then return to their hidden pantry throughout winter. Nuthatches creep head-first down trunks to find insect eggs tucked in the bark. Cardinals and titmice forage through the seed heads of prairie plants, dried berries along woodland edges, and anything they can pick from your backyard feeders.

This is where habitat really matters. Our local parks preserve a mix of prairies, wetlands, and woodlands that offer dependable winter food sources. Native prairie grasses hold seeds well into January. Sumac, dogwood, and viburnum shrubs keep bright berries hanging through the cold months. Old oaks and hickories drop acorns and nuts that jays and titmice rely on. Without these preserved areas, winter survival would be much harder for many species.

Screech Owls are small but mighty predators that stay in Ohio all winter and make excellent use of the wooded areas in our parks. During the day, they tuck

themselves into tree cavities, blending into the bark. At night, they quietly patrol prairie edges, meadows, and forest floors, hunting mice, insects, and the occasional unsuspecting songbird. Even in the coldest months, you might hear their soft, wavering trill drifting across a snowy trail in places like George Rogers Clark Park or Kirby Preserve.

Shelter is another key part of winter survival. Birds tuck themselves into evergreens, thickets, and brush piles to get out of the wind. A simple pile of fallen branches in a park or backyard can provide a safe nighttime roost for sparrows, wrens, and chickadees. The wooded ravines in our parks block harsh gusts, while open prairies create sunny pockets where birds can warm up. Even fallen logs, especially in undisturbed corners of nature preserves, give wrens and juncos a place to hide from predators.

Winter water can be surprisingly tough to find. When ponds and shallow creeks freeze, birds still need to drink and keep their feathers clean. Flowing stretches of Buck Creek, the Mad River, and the small streams throughout our parks become vital watering spots through the season. Staying hydrated helps birds digest food and maintain their feathers.



Even in the dead of winter, these birds bring color and life to our parks and backyards. A bright flash of a cardinal on a snow-covered branch, a chickadee’s quick chatter on a frosty morning, or the distant trill of a Screech Owl retreating to its tree cavity at dawn. Clark County’s prairies, woodlands, rivers, and nature preserves aren’t just scenic; they’re essential winter lifelines for the birds and other wildlife that choose to stay here year-round. And their determination keeps our winter trails full of sound, movement, and just a little bit of magic.
