If you are interested in personal assistance, stop by the Parks Administrative Building located at 1301 Mitchell Boulevard in Springfield during our business hours, Monday through Friday, 8a.m. - 5p.m. to register in person.

HOW

Registration is first come, first served until spots are full. Late sign-ups and transfers are allowed only if there's space. A \$5 late fee applies after the deadline. You can register online, by mail, in person, or by phone. Sign up early—programs fill fast! If a program has a deadline, you must register before it. If it's full, you can join the waitlist and will be contacted if a spot opens.

PAYMENT

Payment of fees are due when you register. Phone registrations must be paid by credit card. Please make checks payable to: CCPD (Clark County Park District). Note: \$25 service fee on all returned checks.

CONFIRMATION

Once you send the registration form and fee, you are signed up if there is space. You will get an email with program details. Come to the first class at the scheduled time and place unless told otherwise. Athletic League players will hear from a coach about practice and games after the first meeting.

REFUNDS

All customer-initiated program or activity withdrawals are entitled to receive a household credit for the program fee minus a 15% refund processing fee if requested in the allotted time:
Camps • Two days following the original registration deadline.
Athletics • One month following the original registration deadline.
Special Events - Single Day Events or Instructor-Provided Classes • Prior to original registration deadline.

CCPD reserves the right to cancel or postpone any program or activity upon which the customer is entitled to a full refund of the program fee in the form of a check.

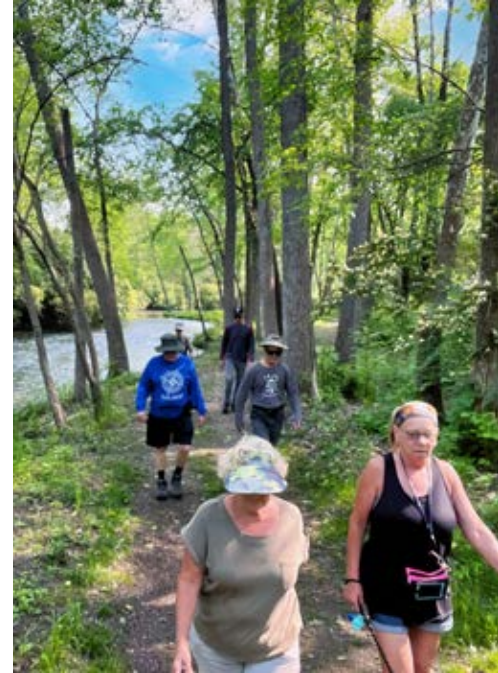

nature FOCUS

THE AMERICAN BEAVER

Clark County's Busy Builders

The American beaver is the largest rodent on the continent and can grow more than 3 feet long, not counting its big, flat tail. Some beavers can weigh up to 100 pounds. Here in Clark County, beavers have made homes across our park system. They can be found in places like Estel Wenrick Wetlands, Buck Creek, and waterways along the Simon Kenton Trail.

BUILT FOR THE WATER

Beavers are excellent swimmers. Their back feet are webbed like swim fins, and their tails help them steer. When they dive, special parts of their bodies help keep water out of their ears, nose, and mouth. They can even stay underwater for up to 15 minutes.

THAT FAMOUS TAIL

A beaver's tail does a lot more than look cool. It helps with balance, stores fat, helps control body temperature, and can warn other beavers of danger. When a beaver slaps its tail on the water, the loud smack tells the family, "Heads up, something's not right!"

WHAT'S FOR DINNER?

Beavers are herbivores, which means they only eat plants. They munch on bark, leaves, twigs, roots, and water plants. They especially like trees such as willow, maple, cottonwood and birch. In the fall, they store branches underwater so they have food during winter.

SUPER TEETH

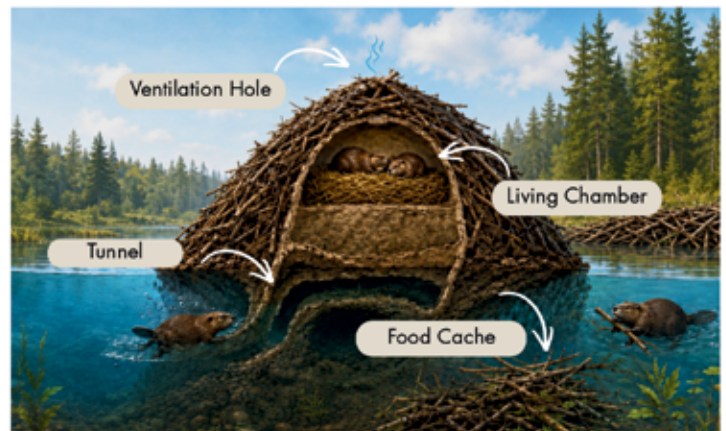
A beaver's front teeth never stop growing. That is why beavers gnaw so much. Their strong orange teeth can cut down small trees quickly. They use branches and logs to build dams and lodges. Tiny hard hats are not required, but honestly, they deserve them.

DAM GOOD BUILDERS

Beavers are famous for building dams with sticks, mud, grass, stones, and branches to slow-moving water. This creates ponds and wetlands that reduce erosion and provide important habitat for fish, birds, insects, plants, and other wildlife. In Clark County, the Park District also manages beaver activity when needed to help protect nearby property, trails, roads, and river access areas from flooding or damage.

COZY LODGE LIFE

A beaver family lives in a lodge made of sticks and mud, with an underwater entrance that helps keep predators out. Inside are dry rooms where beavers rest and raise their babies, called kits. In winter, frozen mud helps protect the lodge.



A COMEBACK STORY

Beavers were once heavily trapped for their fur, especially for hats and coats. By the early 1900s, they had nearly disappeared from Clark County and across Ohio. Thanks to stronger laws and reintroduction efforts, beavers made a strong comeback. Keep your eyes open as you visit one of our nature parks. You may see a beaver swimming or the clues they leave behind.

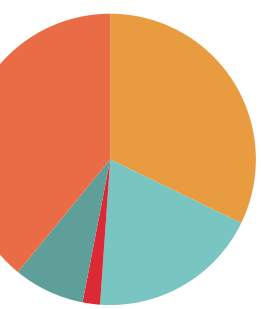

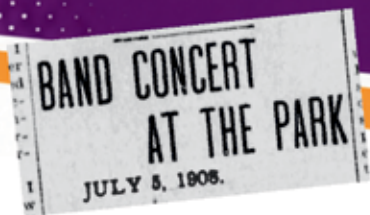

More Than A Century OF ARTS IN OUR PARKS



For generations, our parks have been more than places to walk, play, picnic, and enjoy the outdoors. They have also been places where music, theater, dance, and community come together. Long before many of today's programs and events, local parks were already helping bring the arts to the people. That tradition goes back more than a century. In 1908, free live concerts began in Snyder Park, giving residents a chance to gather outdoors and enjoy music together. That idea, bringing people together through free arts experiences in public spaces, helped set the stage for what would later become one of Clark County's most beloved traditions.

Since 1967, the Springfield Arts Council has presented the Summer Arts Festival, offering admission-free concerts, theater, and entertainment each summer. Today, it is recognized as the longest-running admission-free summer arts festival in the country. The festival's roots are closely tied to local parks. In the late 1960s, the City of Springfield Parks Department (now the Park District) provided funding to the Springfield Symphony Orchestra for concerts at the Snyder Park band shell. Jackson Wiley, conductor of the symphony, helped use that support to build a larger summer arts program. In 1967, he brought together local arts organizations and nonprofits to raise funds for a full month of concerts, plays, and children's activities.

Those early festival events were held in several park locations, including the band shell and large shelter house near the lagoon in Snyder Park, as well as a portable stage near the cliffs in what is now Veterans Park. In 1971, the Arts Council and Parks Department installed a permanent stage in the park using donated materials and volunteer labor. When the Arts Council hired its first executive director in 1974, the organization's office was located upstairs in the equipment barn across from the lagoon in Snyder Park.

Over time, the festival continued to grow and change. Programming eventually became centered in Veterans Park, where major improvements helped create the outdoor performance space many people know and love today. For 60 years, it has welcomed residents to enjoy high-quality entertainment in the park. It has introduced children to live music and theater, created summer memories for generations, and reminded us that the arts should be something everyone can enjoy.

The Park District is proud to be part of that history. Our role in supporting arts in the parks is not limited to one event or one stage. From early free concerts in Snyder Park to today's performances, programs, and partnerships, we continue to believe that parks are natural gathering places for creativity, connection, and community pride.

The Springfield Arts Council has played an important role in helping shape what makes our community so special. We are incredibly grateful for our long-standing partnership and our shared commitment to enriching the lives of residents throughout Clark County. Partnerships like this are essential to the continued success of our community. Local agencies, foundations, nonprofits, schools, businesses, service organizations, and volunteers each work hard to make a positive difference.

Through collaboration, shared resources, and a commitment to serving others, we are able to expand opportunities, create lasting memories, and improve the quality of life throughout Clark County. The 60th anniversary of the Springfield Summer Arts Festival is more than a celebration of performances. It is a celebration of people, parks, partnerships, and the power of working together. We are truly better together, and we sincerely thank the Springfield Arts Council and all of our community partners for the dedication, support, and passion they bring to Clark County.
